Examination Results

Once again Leighton Park students have achieved phenomenal GCSE, A Level and IB results. Our students demonstrate some of the best academic progress in the country. Many congratulations to all our students and I would like to thank the staff for all their work and dedication during the last academic year. It is fantastic that 31% of our A Levels gained were A* or A Grades – a terrific testament to our students' hard work and their teachers' guidance - and our top level GCSE results (Grades 7 -9) were the best in 14 years at 55%.

Attendance and Absence

The School expects all students, including full boarders, to be present at School from the first day to the last day of each term. The term dates for the academic years 2019-20 and 2020-2021 are available on the School website.

All lessons and activities are an important part of a student's learning and School life; unnecessary absence can cause disruption to the learning and co-curricular programme for a whole group.

Day Students

If your son/daughter is not going to be present at School, please telephone the School Office on 0118 987 9600 no later than **8.00am on each day of absence** or alternatively, please email schooloffice@leightonpark.com.

Any requests for a day student to be absent from School for a day or more should usually be sent to the Head of Section, as detailed above, unless it is related to a medical appointment, where the request should be sent to the Housemaster/Housemistress and Tutor, copying in the School Office.

Boarders

Any requests for a boarder to arrive late at the start of term or leave early at the end of term must be sent for approval to the Head of Section, as detailed above. All requests must be sent well in advance. Please give the reason for making this request but understand that only exceptional reasons will gain approval. Flights and travel arrangements must not be made prior to making such requests as permission for absence may not be granted.

Any requests for a boarder to be absent from School for a day or more should also be sent to the Head of Section for approval unless it is related to university entrance, or weekend leave, where the request should be sent to the Housemaster/Housemistress.
