1	<p><b>Girl, Woman, Other</b> by Bernardine Evaristo 464 pages</p> 	<p>This is Britain as you've never read it. This is Britain as it has never been told.</p> <p>From Newcastle to Cornwall, from the birth of the twentieth century to the teens of the twenty-first, <i>Girl, Woman, Other</i> follows a cast of twelve characters on their personal journeys through this country and the last hundred years. 2	<p><b>The Silent Patient</b> by Alex Michaelides 336 pages</p> 	<p>Alicia Berenson's life is seemingly perfect. A famous painter married to an in-demand fashion photographer, she lives in a grand house with big windows overlooking a park in one of London's most desirable areas. One evening her husband Gabriel returns home late from a fashion shoot, and Alicia shoots him five times in the face, and then never speaks another word. Alicia's refusal to talk, or give any kind of explanation, turns a domestic tragedy into something far grander, a mystery that captures the public imagination and casts Alicia into notoriety. The price of her art skyrockets, and she, the silent patient, is hidden away from the tabloids and spotlight at the Grove, a secure forensic unit in North London. Theo Faber is a criminal psychotherapist who has waited a long time for the opportunity to work with Alicia. 3	<p><b>Born a Crime</b> by Trevor Noah 304 pages</p> 	<p>One of the comedy world's brightest new voices, Trevor Noah is a light-footed but sharp-minded observer of the absurdities of politics, race and identity, sharing jokes and insights drawn from the wealth of experience acquired in his relatively young life. As host of the US hit show <i>The Daily Show with Trevor Noah</i>, he provides viewers around the globe with their nightly dose of biting satire, but here Noah turns his focus inward, giving readers a deeply personal, heartfelt and humorous look at the world that shaped him.</p> <p>Noah was born a crime, son of a white Swiss father and a black Xhosa mother, at a time when such a union was punishable by five years in prison. Living proof of his parents' indiscretion, Trevor was kept mostly indoors for the first years of his life, bound by the extreme and often absurd measures his mother took to hide him from a government that could, at any moment, take him away.</p> <p>A collection of eighteen personal stories, <i>Born a Crime</i> tells the story of a mischievous young boy growing into a restless young man as he struggles to find his place in a world where he was never supposed to exist. <i>Born a Crime</i> is equally the story of that young man's fearless, rebellious and fervently religious mother - a woman determined to save her son from the cycle of poverty, violence and abuse that ultimately threatens her own life.</p>	<p>Monday 18<sup>th</sup> January 2021</p> <p>7.30 – 9.00pm</p>

4	<p><b>The Giver of Stars</b> by Jojo Moyes 448 pages</p> 	<p>From the author of <i>Me Before You</i>, set in Depression-era America, a breathtaking story of five extraordinary women and their remarkable journey through the mountains of Kentucky and beyond.</p> <p>Alice Wright marries handsome American Bennett Van Cleve hoping to escape her stifling life in England. But small-town Kentucky quickly proves equally claustrophobic, especially living alongside her overbearing father-in-law. So when a call goes out for a team of women to deliver books as part of Eleanor Roosevelt's new traveling library, Alice signs on enthusiastically.</p> <p>The leader, and soon Alice's greatest ally, is Margery, a smart-talking, self-sufficient woman who's never asked a man's permission for anything. They will be joined by three other singular women who become known as the Packhorse Librarians of Kentucky.</p> <p>What happens to them—and to the men they love—becomes an unforgettable drama of loyalty, justice, humanity and passion. These heroic women refuse to be cowed by men or by convention. And though they face all kinds of dangers in a landscape that is at times breathtakingly beautiful, at others brutal, they're committed to their job: bringing books to people who have never had any, arming them with facts that will change their lives.</p> <p>Based on a true story rooted in America's past, <i>The Giver of Stars</i> is unparalleled in its scope and epic in its storytelling. Dr Annick Swenson's work is shrouded in mystery; she refuses to report on her progress, especially to her investors, whose patience is fast running out. Anders Eckman, a mild-mannered lab researcher, is sent to investigate. A curt letter reporting his untimely death is all that returns.</p> <p>Now Marina Singh, Anders' colleague and once a student of the mighty Dr Swenson, is their last hope.
